Less on 1	LO: To know how to locate places using 4 and 6 figure grid references SK: I know grid references are used to find specific locations and I know how to use them	Learn how to use 4-fig and 6-fig grid references The four-figure grid reference is always given for the bottom left hand corner of the square (the South West corner) and you always write the Eastings before the Northings [Hint: Along the corridor and up the stairs] Children to have different grid reference map and record the grid references. Children to also have a look at the compass points and map symbols in order to develop their skills next lesson to locate symbols on the map. Map taken from the Hull ordinance survey map which we all have a copy of.

	SK: The land by the river is used for industry, entertainment	map symbols What type of industries are there along the Humber? Locate them on the map and record the grid reference. Children to all have a map, label the physical and human features and record the grid references.

Focus on the docks but also the fruit market- what was there? What was it used for? Where is Queens gardens and what was it used for? Review and research the history or Queens gardens? Look at old photos of how it has changed over time? Children to predict first what it used to be then see if their predictions are true		
	SK: I know that Queen's Gardens used to be a fishing dock and was covered in water	Task- children to look at the pictures and label the changes which have happened in Queen's gardens. Why has it now changed? What have influenced the changes?

SK: The fruit market was once a place to trade goods but it is now used for entertainment such as shops, restaurants and museums	Trip to Hull- trip down the river to see docks from the river, fruit market and walk around Queen's Gardens and Prince's Quay and compare to historical maps. What is there now? Discuss then and now Discuss modern trade/ do a land use survey by using a key to colour/identify what the buildings and land are used for e.g entertainment (restaurants at marina), industry, hotels, residential. Could do this with a focus on 3 different areas- ferry port/ Seimens, fruit market and Queen's Gardens? Using photos as evidence and the first hand experience compare the areas from then and now. How have they change and why?

Look at data on amount of fish exported now in comparison to other points in history. Hull's main trade- Children to have a picture of Hull docks, they are to research what items were traded and what are now traded. Children to use data to display the fishing industry data. Children to make graphs to show the decline in fish exports.
