Lesson 1	LO: To know how to locate places using 4 and 6 figure grid references SK: I know grid references are used to find specific locations and I know how to use them	Learn how to use 4-fig and 6-fig grid references.  The four-figure grid reference is always given for the bottom left hand corner of the square (the South West corner) and you always write the Eastings before the Northings [Hint: Along the corridor and up the stairs]  Activity 1 -  Children to have different grid reference maps and record the grid references.  Activity 2 -  Children to also have a look at the compass points and map symbols in order to develop their skills next lesson to locate symbols on the map.
Lesson 2	LO: To use grid references to name and locate the Hull docks SK: I know the names of the docks in Hull e.g. Victoria	Recap previous lesson - What are grid references?  Look at different ordinance survey maps from around Hull. What symbols can they see on the maps? What do those symbols mean?  WTS - to work with a TA to practice the skill of reading grid references.  Display images of Hull docks on the board, what are the docks? What are they used for?  Activity -  Use maps to locate and identify different docks in Hull using grid references.

	How many docks are there and what are they called? Use google Maps/digi maps to look at them in detail.
LO: To identify features of	Recap the use of using grid references on the maps. How do we do it? Why is it more accurate?
using grid	What are physical and human features? What features can we see around the docks? Are they physical or Human?
map symbols	Discuss land use around the docks and identify features (physical and human) using grid references and map symbols.
SK: The land by the river is	What type of industries are there along the Humber? Locate them on the map and record the grid reference.

entertainment	Children to all have a map, label the physical and human features and record the grid references.
LO: To understand	Use historical maps to identify features of the docks and how they have changed over time.
maps can be	Focus on the docks in Hull. E.g. Marina, Princes Dock is now Princes Quay (shopping Centre)

area has changed.	Show the children pictures of Queens Gardens. Predict what it used to be like. Were the children's predictions correct?
