		Remind the children that Hull was an important fishing industry in the past. St Andrew's Dock became the home of Hull's massive fishing fleet when it was opened in 1883. The dock was named after St Andrew, the patron saint of fishermen. In 1972 it was decided to move the fishing industry to its new home on Albert Dock and on 3 November 1975 St. Andrews was closed to shipping. In 1985 the dock was filled in and it is now the site of a retail park named St. Andrew's Quay.
